Awards & Recognition

Below are a highlights of the department's 2023 awards and recognition.



National Parks & Recreation Association Certified Park and Recreation Executive (CPRE)

CPRE establishes a national standard for managerial, administrative, and executive parks and recreation professionals and was awarded to Chris Waite. He is one of only six professionals within Oregon to have attained this level of certification.

Oregon State Marine Board (OSMB) Facility Grants

Through a multi-department effort, the City received two grants from OSMB totalling just under \$600,000. These funds will be used at Nugent Park for improvements to the boat launch and parking. Additionally, they will be used to begin studies for the Umatilla Marina's future renovation.

Local Grant - Walmart Giving

In May of 2023, the Parks and Recreation Department received a \$1,500 grant to support recreation programs through Walmart Giving. Luke Romero was responsible for submitting the application.



Arbor Month Booster Grant

Due to a successful application submitted by Noemy Vega, the Parks & Recreation Department received a grant to fund the planting of trees during Arbor Day.


The majority of these events were free and open to the community, with Landing Days being one of our most successful events in Umatilla this year having the greatest turnout in the event's history.




Programming Revenue from CivicRec

Currently, we have 2,821 individual accounts in our recreation registration software. The chart above breaks down new accounts by year.
917 new accounts were created in 2022 and 990 new accounts were created in 2023





The 2023 year was full of many adventures for the Parks and Recreation Department. This was our first full year as a stand alone department, and we have had many successes and opportunities for growth along the way. As a department, we had over 25 programs/classes/special events planned within this past year. Among these, we have several that have become very popular like adult bingo as well as special events that hold a "special" place in the hearts of our community members like our Trick-or-Treat on 6th Street.

Rock the Locks was a huge undertaking for the City and our department this year. Our staff focused on making the event as safe and enjoyable as possible while maintaining the quality of our other programs and services. Through this process, our department gained many new skills. As with every new event, there are things we learned and will improve on. However, we are proud of the product we produced. Beyond Rock the Locks, the Recreation Division saw growth in participation in many other the events and program.

Below is a summary of programs and events that took place this past year.

2023 Programs and Classes

Water Palooza

Water Palooza was a free event for the community that was held in July. We setup an inflatable success. The season began in April and ran obstacle course, waterslide and a giant slip and slide. The day ended with a free raffle for everyone in attendance. The event brought in roughly coached by volunteers and the games were of-600 participants and was a huge success as was last year.

Junior Golf Camp

This year the Parks and Recreation team collaborated with Hermiston Parks and Recreation to put on a Jr. golf camp at The Big River Golf Course. The golf camp was a four-day event where we taught the junior golfers all three hitting techniques (driver, irons and putting). The camp brought in 44 participants which maxed out our registration, we also had participants placed on a waiting list.

NFL Flag Football

This year's season of Flag Football was a huge through June 3rd. There were 13 teams with games played on Saturdays. The teams were ficiated by seasonal recreation employees. We had a very successful year with no games cancelled. The leage increase to 120 participants.

Flashlight Egg Hunt

This year's egg hunt had a great turn out, so much so, that it blew past our expected attendance levels. Despite the rain the day of the event, we had over 150 children participate. Staff is considering chaninging the format next year to better accomodate the program growth.



Arbor Day

For Arbor Day we had the 5th grade class of MHES come out and participate in 5 different educational and activity stations. Thanks to volunteers and the assistance of the Public Works and Golf Course staff the event went smoothly. The 5th grade classes were able to choose a representative from each class to join the City Administrator in planting Lulu the Linden tree at Hash Park. The name was selected by the students during the event. We now have an additional 19 trees within the McNary area due to Arbor Day.

Fishing Derby

For this wonderful one-day event, Parks & Rec staff set up at the McNary Fishing Pond. Thanks to the help of Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, we were able to tag 150 fish that participating children could turn into the City's tent to claim a prize. A total of 700 fish were stocked in the ponds. Roger's Toyota sponsored the event as in years past and came out to hand out free hot dogs.

Intro to Kayaking

Earlier this year all Parks and Recreation Coordinators became certified as official ACA (American Canoe Association) kayak instructors. This allowed us to host a three-series introduction to kayaking course. The first 2 classes were designed to be instructional courses that taught kayak entry, basic strokes and maneuvers, and self-rescues. The third class was a group excursion where we took participants from Warehouse Beach to Hat Rock State Park that focused on navigating water ways using skills learned in the previous classes. We had ten participants for the first two classes and a total of fifteen participants on the final trip.

Scavenger Hunt

We revamped the scavenger this year by involving businesses as part of the scavenger hunt. Over the 5 weeks, we engaged with participating businesses to solicit ideas changes and improvements to future events. Overall, we had a total of 13 winners!

Baseball/Softball Camp

Staff ran the camp teaching basic skills to participants of both baseball and softball. Additional support was provided by coaches from the surrounding area.

Spring Break Expo

This was a five-day event geared towards children that were off on vacation during Spring Break. The program offered scavenger hunts as well as planned tournament activities. The event will be restructured next year to improve quality by concentrating activities in a shorter time frame.



Landing Days

Thanks to the combined effort of a vast majority of City staff and the careful planning, Landing Days 2023 was a major success. This event blew past our expected attendance with the parking lot filling in the later half of Saturday. Staff did a tremendous job enacting parking contingency plans. Quiet Riot was the headliner on Saturday and drew a large crowd, that required some mid-event alterations to accommodate the large participation.

As this event will only continue to grow, we have been making plans to increase capacity in areas ranging from food vendors and parking to security.

Rock the Locks

Rock the Locks was one of our greatest learning experiences this year. Planning and preparation took place over the course of the entire year. Department staff worked collaboratively with other City departments and community partners to bring this festival together. It exemplified what can be achieved when group works together. In addition to directly planning the festival, department staff designated time to study other festivals in similar venues.

Staff is excited to take the lessons learned from the success and challenges of the first year to make 2024 an incredible event.

RTL Fun Facts:

- Made 176 visits to businesses seeking sponsors for both LD's & RTL's
- Collected 77 different business cards
- Went on air at 106.5 Eagle 8 times promoting RTL's



Professional Development

Since many of our department staff are new to the field, we have prioritized training and development as a department to ensure we grow our skills to better serve the community. Staff has participated in Parks and Recreation conferences and training at the state and national level during 2023. In addition to these trainings, four staff members are attending a Special Event Management school to gain more insights into how to run large events.

In addition to training, staff are volunteering on several state grant review committees and on the board of the Oregon Recreation and Parks Association.

Marina & RV Park Divison

2023 was a very productive year for the Marina, RV Park and Boyd's Place. The new contract changes implemented at the marina are making the docks safer and cleaner for all to enjoy. The RV Park was booked at max capacity most of the summer. Boyd's house has been a great addition to our facilities expanding service offerings.

Marina

In January of 2023, new Marina Lease
Agreement and slip prices were
implemented. In addition to this change,
we have also made marina work order
forms available to all our moorage holders.
These work order forms give our moorage
holders a way to request work done at their
slip or dock. These changes have been
accompanied by the removal of derelict
vessels from our facility and removal of RVs
from dry storage.

May 12th and 13th marked the first Seaworthy/Safety Vessel inspection with Umatilla County Senior Marine Deputy Hayes. This gave our moorage holders and the public the opportunity to have their vessels inspected and brought up to code with our lease agreement and Coast Guard and Marine Board regulations. Following the inspections, staff worked with moorage holders to get vessels into compliance with the regulations.

The boat pump station was inspected and closed for the winter. We have received new signs to be installed on the fuel dock.


RV Park

During the Winter long-term stay periods in 2022-23 and 2023-24, we filled up the RV Park to 50% capacity. Half of the 14 sites available were reserved for long-term stays and were booked the entire winter.

RV campsites rates were increased on July 1st, changing from \$40 to \$46. Every weekend in May through October we were sold out of RV campsites and occasionally we sold out of dry camping as well.

Total Stays: 2023 - 7,411

Months with the highest number of stays were September, June and July in that order.






Boyd's Place

Boyd's House is being utilized more each year. In 2023, Boyd's house was reserved for 168 nights, 42 more than in 2022. Graph A shows the number of nights sold per month. July was the busiest month of 2023.

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Tournaments/Events:

We hosted a week-long junior golf camp, three company outings, three leagues ranging between six and thirty weeks long, as well as the first annual Rock the Locks Music Festival. Moving into the 2024 season, we will be looking to move smaller events to weekday tournaments or eliminate them completely if they are not of an adequate size. This will allow more open weekends for annual members to maximize the course as well as walk-traffic to maximize revenue.

Annual Membership/Customer Appreciation Meeting:

On Wednesday evening, November 8th, we hosted our annual Customer Appreciation Evening at the City Hall. Approximately 10 members/customers showed up for the event to give feedback as well as listen to what is in store in the coming year(s). The course received a lot of positive feedback for the work done on the course in general. Customers noticed and appreciated all the work being done by the staff as well as the monetary City contributions to secure proper equipment and irrigation needs.

Rock the Locks Music Festival:

The first annual RTL music festival was hosted at Big River Golf Course October 6-8th. Getting the course ready for the festival was a year-long project for the maintenance crew, City staff, and the prison workers who came in to help with manual labor. The golf course involvement mainly consisted of infrastructure for the event, not planning, and easing concerns of members and guests that frequent the course. Initially, the event was met with much hesitation and resistance. Members eventually resigned to the idea of the festival and then waited on the outcome before judging. The overwhelming response from golfers was that the course held up much better than expected and the event went smoother than anticipated. However, with more preparation time and knowledge moving forward, the course will continue to be even more prepared to host the event. The maintenance staff did an incredible job prepping the ground for the event. The irrigation and seeding came in perfectly, resisted damage, and looked amazing. Members and guests appreciate the roughs no longer being "rough" and realize that the concert prep also benefits them year-round.


The golf course grounds crew has remained hard at work and is doing an incredible job. They are watering full time and seeing a lot of visual improvement in the rough areas after installing the additional water lines this winter and spring. The upgraded water has drastically improved the previously barren ground. The putting green going in by hole #9 green has been designed, shaped, and stripped of grass and is just now awaiting the needed sod. There are an additional twelve new cart sheds being installed and the first one just arrived. These twelve sheds will make quite an impact on our waiting list and leave it at a much more reasonable size.

Membership Drive:

We currently have 198 members for 2024, which is up from the 189 we had in 2023. We had 55 new members this year so far, 20 of which came in on the new member referral program we implemented. Our goal is to have an approximate 25-35 member increase in 2024 compared to 2023.





Upcoming in 2024:

In early 2024, we will solidify the 2024 Event Calendar and publish this information on Facebook, Instagram and the golf course webpage. The calendar will also be sent out to our subscribed members. 2024 will also bring the opportunity to offer tee times both through call in and online booking. Members will have increased time frames within which they can book for, and guests will have a smaller window. GPS units will be added to all of our carts (excluding rental carts brought in for large events) and this will allow the pro shop to marshal from inside the pro shop. This will further allow the pro shop to track pace of play, people skipping holes, people keeping carts, people leaving the property, people playing extra holes etc. The other significant benefits include the ability to know when carts are expected back so as new customers arrive we can give accurate wait times and we will be able to communicate with carts as needed. We will also be bringing in more product with our logo this year as well. We will get some crested gear directly from our golf vendors as well as generic product we can add our logo to and sell at a lower price point. There is a demand for this type of product and we will be carrying a wider variety of hats, shirts, and jackets with the Big River logo.
